


PERU – QUELLAVECO



ACTIONS IDENTIFIED FOR SUPPORTING THE RESPONSE TO COVID-19

In Peru, Anglo American is working to identify additional actions to support communities in the response to COVID-19 during lockdown and beyond. Quellaveco's contribution to the COVID-19 response includes:



Nutrition

Distribution of 15,500 non-perishable food packages to vulnerable families in Moquegua, Torata, Samegua, Ilo, El Algarrobal and Sanchez Cerro.

Distribution of breakfast and lunch packs to the police, medical workers and army personnel

Distribution of 3,000 fresh food packages with agricultural products to vulnerable stakeholder groups



Health care support

Provision of medical PPE such as masks (43,000), disposable gowns (1,000) and gloves (33,000)

Offering two vehicles to help transport health personnel Donation of six intensive care units, consisting of: ICU bed, life support ventilator, vital signs monitor, volumetric infusion pump, manual resuscitation pump

Sponsorship of fumigation campaigns in coordination with local fire departments for four months
